## SCHOLARSHIP GIVES UBC STUDENT HEAD START

"I believe that contributing money to a university is one of the greatest gifts you can give," says **Amy Edwards**, a second year student at UBC's Okanagan campus and a recipient of the Deepak Binning Foundation Community Builder Scholarship.

Amy received one of two \$3,500 scholarships after being nominated by her high school teachers for her academic excellence and leadership skills. She enrolled at UBC as a B.Sc. student, but recently transferred to the Human Kinetics program, which she felt naturally gelled with a lifelong interest in health and personal training.

"My mom is a nurse, so I grew up hearing random stories and facts about the human body," explains Amy, who plans to pursue a career in physiotherapy. "I think that played a big part in it. Plus, it's very intriguing. When you consider the body and how muscles work, it's arguably the greatest machine in existence. I want to be able to help people who get hurt, to teach them how to exercise and care for themselves."

Enrolling at UBC Okanagan was a no-brainer for Amy, who says she always planned to attend because it had an excellent reputation and allowed her to stay close to her home in Vernon, BC.

Since becoming a part of the UBC community, Amy enthusiastically describes what she calls a welcoming "family" atmosphere, but emphasizes the importance the scholarship played in helping her adapt to university life.

"Receiving this scholarship allowed me to focus less on the cost of supplies, books, and courses. It made the first year transition a

lot easier. It costs a lot to go to university. If you don't have the money, it can be hard to focus on what you are there to do."

The Deepak Binning Foundation Community Builder Scholarship was named after Inderjeet Deepak Binning, who died of cancer shortly after graduating from Richmond's J.H. Cambie Secondary School in 1999. His friends and family subsequently created the Deepak Binning Foundation in 2000, which endows two scholarships of \$3,500 to students entering the Okanagan campus from high schools across the Southern Interior of BC.

"I was stressed out," says Amy. "Receiving this scholarship let me focus on what I was actually there to do, which is study. I'd encourage anyone to give money to a university, because I know you can help someone's future a lot." ■

## UBC GRADUATE ESTABLISHES TRAVEL AWARD FOR ARTS STUDENTS

"I'm interested in death, dying, and 'disposal,'" says **Lakhbir K. Jassal**, with a BA (2007) and an MA (2008) from UBC.

Although she touts herself as a necrogeographer, this alumna's professional life is anything but dead. She recently completed her doctorate in Edinburgh, launched a study about the politics of the funeral industry, and even established the Dr. Lakhbir K. Jassal Graduate Travel Award in Arts, which will benefit students who need funds when travelling for the purposes of research or presentation.

For anyone wondering what a necrogeographer does, Lakhbir explains that her focus revolves around the cultural and political geographies of death and expands to areas like the funeral industry, migration, ritual systems, culture, justice, and gender.

"I wanted to go to UBC as far back as I remember," says the BC native. "And I worked hard to get there. I owe a big thanks to the professors here who impacted my life. It's because of them I wanted to pursue my doctorate."

As a scholarship winner both at UBC and the University of Edinburgh, Lakhbir explains her motivation behind establishing the award.

"I know the almost magical feeling of having support to pursue your education. I was honoured to get scholarships at both places. However, a scholarship only covers so much. Even with fieldwork funds, realistically grads do not always have enough to cover costs."

Because of Lakhbir's generosity, two awards of \$750 are now available to graduate students in the areas of Human Geography, Anthropology (socio-cultural or medical focus),

Asian Studies, and Asia Pacific Policy Studies. Students must have an excellent academic record and demonstrated financial need. Recipients will be chosen by the four respective departments, in consultation with the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

Lakhbir funded the award through a graduation gift from her grandfather, whom she describes as "exotic in all senses of the term."

"Education is immensely important to him. Without it, he says a person is blind. Moreover, he feels that if you support students, either financially or through knowledge or training, they'll help other members of society later."

Lakhbir now has her sights set on becoming a professor and hopes to land an exciting post in the near future. In the meantime, she plans to continue her work of overcoming perceived negativity of death and bringing a rich and complex industry out from behind the shroud. ■

## FACULTY WOMEN'S CLUB NEARING 100 YEARS OF PHILANTHROPY

"The Faculty Women's Club (FWC) has been a part of UBC for almost a hundred years," explains Club Past President **Barbara Tait**. "We are the oldest service club on campus. We were formed in 1917."

Although there are dozens of members today, the club was born when twenty women, all wives of faculty members, responded to a call for help from the university's first president, Frank F. Wesbrook (1913-1918). UBC was about to welcome its first female students and women were needed to help inspect and approve their accommodations. These volunteers subsequently decided to form a club and began fundraising. In 1919, they established the Anne Wesbrook Scholarship.

Nearly one hundred years later, the club has evolved considerably and offers a range of interest groups as diverse as its members. However, its mandate remains the same. "We're still true to our original purpose—to fundraise and be of service to UBC and its students," says President **Ann Thompson**. "Any woman affiliated with UBC can join: faculty, staff, spouses, partners, post docs, grad students. We welcome everyone."

Although scholarships are a big part of the Faculty Women's Club, it has played a diverse role in UBC's development. "Members have always been on hand, quietly working behind the scenes whenever a request was made," explains Barbara.

Historically, FWC members helped set up an on-campus food bank during the Depression, they've raised funds for various building projects, furnished spaces, and even helped welcome soldiers home from the World Wars.

"As part of our fundraising efforts, different events are held every year," says Ann. "For example, fashion shows and boutiques. We had an Antiques Roadshow. We cater for Just Desserts. We held a very successful silent auction last year."

Currently the Faculty Women's Club supports 12 student awards, often named for remarkable women, both leaders and academics, connected to the university. Today, the principal of these funds amounts to about a half million dollars, which endows students with over \$15,000 every year.


"This year the club donated \$20,000 to the Ida Green Scholarship," says Ann, who notes that many investments were hurt by the market crash. "But we've done a good job recouping, and all our scholarships are back above water."

Both Ann and Barbara agree that supporting students through the Faculty Women's Club just makes sense. "The future is in their hands," says Barbara. "I think we should support students for the good of the country."

During the history of the Faculty Women's Club, Ann conservatively calculates that over 300 students have received financial aid from the current awards. As the Club prepares to welcome the new UBC President, both women are hopeful that it will continue to thrive as an important part of UBC.

"We've done well for almost a hundred years," says Barbara. "We help a lot of people, and we have a lot of fun in doing so. And we plan on continuing to help the UBC community!" ■

# ESTATE GIFT CELEBRATES DEAN'S GENEROSITY

"I've wanted to make a gift to UBC since I was 20 years old," says alumnus **Richard "Rick" Corbett**, who graduated with a B.A. in Geography in 1971.

For Rick, creating an estate gift was his way of recognizing a kind act by **Professor Walter Henry Gage**, who served as the sixth President of the University of British Columbia from 1969 to 1975.

"I was from out of province and ineligible for both BC and Ontario financial assistance programs," explains the Goderich, Ontario native. "I was dependent on a federal student loan for out-of-province students, which was a maximum of \$1,000 per year paid in two instalments."

It was January, and tuition for the second term was due. Although Rick had his cheque in-hand, he couldn't cash it.

"At that time, there was one bank on campus, and they either wouldn't cash it or wanted to put an obscenely long hold on it. Basically, I couldn't pay my tuition, and I was worried."

After agonizing to a few friends, Rick was pointed in the direction of Professor Gage. After making an appointment, Rick decided to walk over to the Arts building where Professor Gage had his office. "I explained my problem to the secretary, and she let me in. I was nineteen, and I still remember his office. It was huge and looked exactly the way a professor's office should."

Professor Gage invited Rick to take a seat before sitting down beside him, a gesture Rick still recalls as wonderfully human touch.

"He listened intently before reaching into his pocket and pulling out \$500 in large bills, which he just gave to me. He was no-fuss. He just said to bring back the money when the cheque cleared." Rick did repay his loan, but didn't see Dr. Gage at the time and never encountered him afterwards.

Over the years, Rick made several small contributions to the university, but still wanted do more. By making an estate gift, he was able to contribute a significant amount to enhance the Walter Gage Bursary endowment fund, which is available to help students facing their own tough times.

"For me, it's not so much about recognizing him," explains Rick. "I think the act of doing something like this should be celebrated. It's difficult being on a restricted budget. I'd like to be able to help people who encounter unforeseen things in their school lives. If students have a place to go when they hit a bump in the road, that would make me happy." ■

## TRANSFORMATION THROUGH EDUCATION FOR MASTERCARD SCHOLAR

For MasterCard Foundation Scholar **Patrick Munyurangabo**, education is transformation. As a Food Nutrition and Health undergrad at UBC, he is gaining knowledge that could help to bring about positive change in his home district of Rwamagana, Rwanda.

Patrick is one of an expected 112 students from Africa who are living and working at UBC thanks to a \$25 million grant from the MasterCard Foundation. The

scholarship provides students from sub-Saharan Africa with financial, academic, and social support as well as opportunities for community service and internships. It's all part of an initiative to foster a new generation of leaders that will contribute to the growth, development and transformation of their communities.

"I'm studying International Nutrition," says Patrick, who explains that nutrition and education are linked. "There are so many kids who do not go to school, because they do not have food. However, there are also people who do not eat well, because they have not been educated about nutrition."

Although Patrick originally planned to study medicine at UBC, he changed his mind when he saw that many patients in his home district were hospitalized due to malnutrition. "Sometimes they didn't have someone to show them how to eat properly—to get the nutrition they need. Or they don't know about preparation, so they end up with bacterial diseases. I think prevention is better than treatment."

As a MasterCard Foundation Scholar, Patrick has a busy schedule. He's studying hard and recently attended the African Storybook Summit, an innovative digital project that promotes early literacy in sub-Saharan Africa. He also still enjoys an impromptu game of basketball as a way of meeting new people. After completing his first year, he praises UBC as a place that's helping him to fulfill his goals and set new ones.

Patrick hopes to start a literacy program for children in Rwamagana. "I feel like education is not a priority there, and I want to help change that. I want to make lives better through education and nutrition."

Patrick's greatest hope is to affect genuine change in other people's lives, and he believes knowledge is the key. "Everything is based on education. Poverty is a broad term. I don't like to say poverty is the biggest challenge we have. That's too simple. People need to learn to think differently. That affects everything—belief, nutrition, government." ■

# A QUICK GUIDE TO AWARD TYPES

## SCHOLARSHIPS

These monetary awards recognize academic achievement and help students with the cost of continuing their education. Scholarships are merit-based, and recipients must be in the top 10% of their class or have an average of 75% or higher.

## BURSARIES

Bursaries are non-repayable awards that help to fill the gap between a student's assessed financial need and available government assistance. UBC's Policy 72 states that "No eligible student will be prevented from commencing or continuing his or her studies at the university for financial reasons alone."

## FELLOWSHIPS

These prestigious awards enable graduate students to concentrate full-time on their studies and research. They are granted on the basis of academic excellence and/or research productivity.

## PRIZES

Students can receive prizes for academic excellence or achievement in a particular subject area. Prizes usually take the form of a monetary award.

## AWARDS

Awards recognize either (or both) academic excellence or achievement in a range of non-academic fields such as, community service, student leadership, volunteerism, and athletic or artistic performance. They are given to both undergraduate and graduate students.
